Teaching Tips for Parents Getting Ready to Toilet Train

Why?

- ► When we think about toilet training, we think about wet and dry.
- Incontinence will impact your family and child in later life







What are some of the factors that affect learning to use the toilet?

- Is your child dry for at least 90 minutes?
- Can your child sit on toilet for 5 minutes?
- Can your child complete simple directions?





While you are waiting for your child to be "ready"

- Acquire the materials/equipment do you need to teach "going potty"
- What do we do in a bathroom? What are specific bathroom/toileting rules and routines in your house?





What we can do while waiting for readiness.....

- Change diaper/pull ups in bathroom pair with an icon for going to the bathroom
- ▶ If possible, have your child stand up to get his/her pull up changed; this allows for more active participation for your child (wiping, flushing toilet with used toilet paper, hand washing etc.)
- Provide reinforcement preferably in the bathroom





Which skills can you teach now?

- 1. Walk into the bathroom
- 2. Turn light on
- 3. Close the door
- 4. Pull pants down
- 5. Pull underwear down
- 6. Sit on toilet seat
- 7. Go "pee"
- 8. Pull off 6 pieces of toilet paper
- 9. Fold toilet paper
- 10. Wipe front to back

- 11. Drop toilet paper into toilet
- 12. Stand up
- 13. Pull underwear up
- 14. Pull pants up
- 15. Flush the toilet
- 16. Walk to the sink
- 17. Turn on the water
- 18. Push soap dispenser 2 times
- 19. Rub hands together
- 20. Put hands under the water and rinse soap off
- 21. Turn off the water
- 22. Dry hands with towel
- 23. Leave bathroom
